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General Information



WEST GEORGIA COLLEGE

HISTORY

West Georgia College is a coeducational, residential, liberal arts institution located in Carrollton. A senior college unit of the University System of Georgia, it enrolls students from most counties in Georgia, as well as from other states and several foreign countries.

The College is situated on the western side of Carrollton, the county seat of Carroll County and one of Georgia's fastest growing industrial areas. Carrollton serves a regional population of more than 100,000 as a center for retail shopping, medical and educational services, entertainment and recreational activities, and financial services. Carrollton is an hour's drive from Atlanta via Interstate 20.

West Georgia College originated in 1906 as the Fourth District Agricultural and Mechanical School, one of twelve such institutions established by the State of Georgia between 1906 and 1917. Twentyseven years later, Carrollton's A & M School became West Georgia College, a junior college established by an act of the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia. Dr. Irvine S. Ingram, who had been principal of the A & M School, was named the institution's first president.

In 1939, the College was authorized by the Board of Regents to add a three-year program in elementary education. In 1957, the institution was authorized to confer the B.S. degree in Education, making it a four-year senior college unit of the University System of Georgia. Two years later, West Georgia College added a Bachelor of Arts degree in the fields of English, history, and mathematics.

During the following 12 years, West Georgia College became one of the fastest growing institutions of higher learning in the South. From an enrollment of 576 in 1957, the institution's student body doubled every four years. Now with an enrollment of more than 6,000 students, West Georgia offers seven undergraduate degrees, the Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Science in Education, Bachelor of Business Administration, Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Science in Recreation, and Bachelor of Science in Earth Science with majors in nearly 50 different fields.

In 1967, the Board of Regents authorized the initiation of a graduate program at the master's level. The following six Masters degrees are offered in a combined total of 33 areas of study: Master of Arts, Master of Business Administration, Master of Education, Master of Music, Master of Public Administration, and Master of Science; also, the Specialist in Education degree is offered in seven areas of study.

The Associate of Arts, with a major in education, and the Associate of Science, with majors in computer science, criminal justice, nursing, and office administration, have all been added as two-year programs since 1973.

To accommodate the College's growth, a multi-million dollar building program has increased the value of the College's physical facilities to more than \$88.5 million. From a beginning of three small buildings, the College has grown to include more than 40 structures of learning, living, and recreation on its 398-acre wooded campus.

PURPOSE OF THE COLLEGE

West Georgia is a multi-purpose public institution providing a liberal arts experience for all its students as a base for their entire educational program. It provides educational preparation in the liberal arts and for professional careers, community college terminal instruction for students from the local geographical area, and special academic options in honors, general and transitional program areas. It seeks to provide a distinctive and realistic educational environment wherein each student may attain a disciplined and open mind, a capacity for self development, and the knowledge and skills essential for living in a free society. This environment with one's natural and cultural heritage.

In the fulfillment of this purpose, the College asserts its faith in higher education, liberal and otherwise, for all who earnestly seek it and can profit from it. The College emphasizes creative teaching, encourages research, and promotes the general advancement of knowledge through undergraduate and graduate programs within a broad spectrum of studies. Programs and services vital to student life, including attention to physical and mental well-being and the problems of adjusting to societal mores, are provided to complement these academic aims. The College also seeks to serve as a center to promote the development of human and natural resources through continuing education and public service programs.

ACCREDITATIONS AND AFFILIATIONS

West Georgia College is fully accredited through the master's level by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. All programs preparing teachers through the master's level are accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, and the undergraduate School of Business programs are accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business. The College's work in the field of teacher education is fully recognized and accredited by the Georgia State Department of Education. Women graduates of the institution are eligible for membership in the American Association of University Women.

THE CAMPUS

The campus is a unique blend of the old and the new. Covered with a variety of trees and flowers, the campus is dotted with structures of the early 1900's, as well as buildings exemplifying the most contemporary modes of architecture.

On the front or "Old Campus" as it is sometimes called, a three-block-long expanse of rolling hills shaded by scores of old, towering oak, elm, and maple trees surrounds a number of faded brick buildings stretching in a semi-circle adjacent to the park. This is where West Georgia College began as an A & M School in 1906.

Beyond the Old Campus is a modern academic complex composed of a library, social science, humanities, and math-physics buildings, all constructed in recent years. Other buildings in the area include a three-story student center, a health and physical education center featuring a 3,000 seat gymnasium and indoor pool, and one of the most modern college infirmaries in the state.


Much of the College's physical development has been on the western side of the campus. Located in the area is one of the most unique structures in the University System, the Education Center. The structure contains five large lecture-demonstration rooms which can be changed by sliding partitions into an auditorium seating nearly 1,000, an instructional materials center, television and sound recording studios, audio-visual laboratory and dark room, counseling rooms, group observation rooms, study carrels, and other areas of independent study.

Adjacent to the Education Center is the Biology-Chemistry Building, a facility which includes numerous laboratories, classrooms, lecture halls, and the latest scientific equipment. Other new buildings in the area are Tyus Hall, a five-story residence hall which houses upperclassmen, graduate students, and married students; a multi-structure plant operations compound; a food service and activity center that went into operation in 1976, and an observatory completed in 1979.

Eleven residence halls are located on the campus, including the five-story high rise hall previously mentioned. One of the newest halls, Bowdon Hall, was named in honor of Bowdon College, a predecessor of West Georgia College.

Two of the oldest and most treasured buildings on campus are the Kennedy Interfaith Chapel and the Bonner House. The Kennedy Chapel was named in memory of the late President John F. Kennedy. At one time the Chapel was owned by the Episcopal Church and later by the Catholic Church. When a new Catholic Church was constructed, the local group gave the Chapel to the College for non-denominational use. In 1966, it was dedicated by the late Robert F. Kennedy in memory of his brother. The Bonner House, constructed in 1843, is the oldest building on campus. This frame colonial structure was originally built as a plantation home and through the years has served various purposes. Because of its historical nature, the house was selected by the Georgia Historical Commission as the site for a marker outlining the history of the College. The Bonner House was the center of a restoration project completed in 1977 and now serves as a Visitor Center for the campus.










HIGH SCHOOL AND FRESHMAN GRADE POINT AVERAGES OF ENTERING WGC FRESHMEN




SAT SCORES FOR ENTERING WGC FRESHMEN




West Georgia College RETENTION RATES OF FALL QUARTER FRESHMAN CLASSES






Average Age of Student Body









West Georgia College operates through the use of three major budgets:

(1) **The Educational and General (E & G) budget** includes funds received from state appropriations, internal revenues (tuition and fees) and externally funded research grants. E&G funds are used for instruction, research, academic support, student services, institutional support and plant operations.

(2) **The Auxiliary Enterprises budget** includes funds received from food services, housing, the bookstore, and vending machines, and the funds are used to operate each of these activities.

(3) **The Student Activities budget** includes the revenues from activity fees and gate receipts, such as sporting events. These funds are then used to finance some campus student activities such as the debate team, student government, athletic programs, lecture series and concerts.





Library



WEST GEORGIA COLLEGE IRVINE S. INGRAM LIBRARY

The Library is one of the most important centers on any campus and West Georgia College's Irvine Sullivan Ingram Library is one of the most modern library facilities in the state of Georgia. The first phase of this four-story structure was built in 1968 and the addition was completed in 1980 to provide over 85,000 square feet of usable research/storage areas and over 1,000 seating spaces for students and faculty.

The library presently contains seminar and conference rooms, lockable faculty carrels, hundreds of individual study carrels, a room for microform reading, the Annie Belle Weaver Special Collections Room, large areas for reference, periodical materials, maps and the circulating book collection. Computer terminals, video receivers, typewriters and copy machines are also available to assist students and faculty with their study and research.

The Irvine Sullivan Ingram Library presently houses approximately 247,000 bound volumes, 17,000 reels of microfilm, a limited audiovisual collection and more than 721,000 pieces of microform as well as 11,900 maps and charts and 14,000 volumes/pieces of special collection material. The Library currently subscribes to over 1,400 magazines and newspapers and is also the Sixth Congressional District selective depository for over 136,000 United States government publications.

Faculty and graduate students have automated access to materials in other United States libraries via SOLINET's on-line interlibrary lending system and may also apply for a Joint Borrower's Card which can be utilized to check out library materials from any of the other thirty-two University System of Georgia institutions' libraries. Literature searches in all disciplines are available through the automated Dialog Information Retrieval Service and the library also has automated book order and cataloging services to insure maximum efficiency of its material processing operation.

The Learning Resources Center (LRC), located on the ground floor of the Geography/Learning Resources Building with an extension in the Education Center, assists faculty members from all departments in improving instruction through the use of audio-visual equipment and materials. A well-trained staff is available to provide professional services and consultation in developing more effective means of instruction. Services include production of color slides, B & W film and prints, charts, graphs, dry mounting, laminating, transparencies, audio tape production and dubbing, and film procurement from various film libraries. Equipment includes cassette recorders, record players, overhead, opaque, slide, filmstrip and motion picture projectors. The LRC is equipped with a modern television facility located in the Education Center to provide the faculty with up-to-date color video taping capabilities. WWGC, the College's educational FM radio station, is maintained by students and operated under the supervision of LRC.

The staff of the Library and the Learning Resources Center are comprised of thirty-two full-time employees. Approximately 50% of the staff members of the Ingram Library are professional librarians holding faculty rank with appropriate graduate degrees in Library Science from accredited library schools.



OMEGA UTILIZATION

The Computer Center provides technical and liaison support between instructional and research users and the available computational support resources. Faculty, staff, and students can receive guidance about procedures and desirable techniques to be followed when using application packages. Diagnostic analysis support is provided when difficulties are encountered in the use of these resources. Data entry for research, instruction, and administrative work is available. Several high-level programmers plan and develop application systems with the administrative users.

Student Services



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WEST GEORGIA COLLEGE STUDENT SERVICES

Admissions

Members of the Admissions Office staff travel the state talking with high school and junior college students about West Georgia College, show visitors about campus, sponsor visitation days, work with orientation, and process applications for admissions.

Financial Aid

The Financial Aid Office coordinates financial assistance, funded by the federal and state governments, the College, WGC Foundation, companies and individuals, to approximately one-third of West Georgia's students.

Health Services

The Student Health Center, which houses both an outpatient clinic and the infirmary, is under the supervision of a full-time physician. Nurses are on duty 24 hours a day. The Center is in operation from the day residence halls open through the last day of exams each quarter.

Intercollegiate Athletics

West Georgia College is extremely proud of its successful intercollegiate athletic programs. Women participate in basketball, cross country, softball, track, tennis, and volleyball and men in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, tennis, and track. All of the men's teams are affiliated with Division II of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). Women's teams are members of the NCAA and the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA).

The women's basketball team was runner-up for the national championship in 1976 and won the state title in the 1981 and 1982 seasons. Volleyball teams have been equally successful, having won numerous state championships. West Georgia College men produced a national collegiate basketball championship team in 1974 and a national football championship team in 1982.

Athletic grants-in-aid are available in all sports. Excellent athletic facilities include a Health-Physical Education Complex, football field house, tennis courts, track, baseball diamond, indoor pool, weight room, and numerous practice and playing fields.

Intramural Program

Opportunities for recreation, social contacts and healthful exercise are provided by the College through an excellent intramural athletic program for those not participating in intercollegiate athletics. Intramural competition includes football, softball, basketball, volleyball, tennis and track.

Placement & Cooperative Education

The Office of Placement and Cooperative Education provides a centralized placement service for all departments at West Georgia College. The Office serves both students and alumni who are seeking full-time, part-time or summer employment by providing a job listing service whereby students and alumni may keep their resumes, recommendations and related materials on file to be sent to

prospective employers upon request. Campus interviews are scheduled throughout the year with representatives from companies, government agencies and school systems. In addition to maintaining a library of current information on state and federal jobs, the job market in general, and various companies, the staff also conducts workshops on resume writing and interview techniques. This Office coordinates the Co-Op program for students desiring to work and go to college during alternating quarters. It also provides application forms and information about internships for students in business, public service agencies and governmental institutions.

Registrar's Office

The Registrar's staff conduct all registration and early registration activities. The Office publishes the quarterly bulletin of course offerings, provides the recording function for all grades received in course work and sends transcripts when requested by the student. An early registration system enables students to obtain confirmed schedules for the next quarter weeks before the quarter begins.

Residence Life

West Georgia living centers meet the physical needs of comfort, safety, and attractive surroundings and aid in the development of a disciplined mind, a social consciousness, and a large degree of responsibility for governing a group's affairs. To this end, the central Residence Life staff supervises the resident advisors, head residents, and resident managers who live in the halls. The central office staff process all housing applications and make hall and room assignments.

Student Activities

The Student Activities staff plan and direct the many phases of college life not directly related to the classroom. They coordinate offerings of the College Program Board, serve as advisors for Greek organizations, Student Government and other student groups, and organize Homecoming and many other activities.

Student Development Center

The Student Development Center offers a variety of services to all West Georgia College students. In addition to professional counselors being available to assist students in coping with personal problems, the Center conducts workshops on a regular basis to assist students in planning for their futures and in dealing with other concerns about college life. Counseling is available for individuals and for groups exploring career options, and a computerized career guidance program is available to help students determine career interests and preferences. The Center also provides a tutorial service and achievement programs for students with study or learning problems. Disabled students with special needs and problems can utilize services provided by the Center, and international students can obtain assistance and advice regarding housing, immigration matters, finances, personal adjustment and referrals to appropriate members of the College and the Carrollton community.
