Fall 2011 marked the seventh consecutive year total enrollment exceeded 10,000 students with an all-time high enrollment of 11,646. Of that number, 10,029 were undergraduates, breaking another record and marking the first time undergraduate enrollment exceeded 10,000.

Spring 2012 student enrollment was 10,933, which exceeded last spring's by 3.6 percent. The total student credit hours was 129,115, three percent higher than spring 2011. Representing 23 percent of the student body, the freshmen credit hours enrolled was 37 percent of the total credit hours offered.

The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business reaffirmed the accreditation for the Richards College of Business' accounting and business degree programs. Only 643 schools of business, or less than 5 percent worldwide, have earned this distinguished hallmark of excellence in management education.

UWG's undergraduate tuition and fees in 2011-12 totaled \$6,592 for in-state and \$18,568 for out-of-state. Undergraduate tuition and fees for 2012-13 total \$6,710 for in-state and \$18,986 for out-of-state students taking 12 or more semester hours.

Every UWG college exhibits some unique characteristics.

The College of Education enrolls the highest percentage of graduate students. College of Arts and Humanities enrolls almost a third of seniors. The College of Science and Mathematics enrolls a quarter of freshmen who declare a major or pre-major. College of Social Sciences is the second largest college. The Richards College of Business has the highest percentage of male students while the School of Nursing enrolls the highest percentage of female students.

## Student Life

### **Center for Student Involvement**

The Center for Student Involvement facilitates student engagement, leadership, and involvement through over 150 registered student organizations with a wide variety of programs and services including 25 national fraternity and sorority chapters.

### **University Recreation**

University Recreation housed in a state-of-the-art Campus Center inspires, empowers, and educates the University community by providing comprehensive, high-quality, student-focused programs such as group exercise, personal training, club sports, and outdoor recreation, facilities, and services that create community, connectivity, and develop exceptional leaders who value and embody healthy lifestyles.

The Campus Center features the following amenities that provide students with a place to play, learn, relax, and engage:

- 13,000 square foot fitness facility with over 200 pieces of strength and cardiovascular equipment.
- Two 1,500 square-foot aerobics rooms fully equipped with the latest workout equipment provide many group exercise classes.

- 1/8 mile walking/jogging track.
- Four basketball courts.
- 50 ft. and 25 ft. climbing walls with routes to accommodate all experience levels.
- Outdoor Recreation Center where you can check out canoes, bikes, and other outdoor equipment (some items may require a fee/deposit).
- Game room equipped with pool tables, table tennis, video games and much more.
- Locker rooms equipped with showers and daily-use lockers.
- 9,000 square-foot ballroom with A/V capabilities for any large-scale campus event.
- Four meeting rooms in addition to the ballroom.

### **Maurice K. Townsend Center for the Performing Arts**

The Townsend Center for the Performing Arts supports academic departments throughout their various performance and educational endeavors and advocates the Arts and Arts Education to the university and surrounding communities. The Townsend Center is equipped with two performance venues, a 459-seat theatre with proscenium stage and orchestra pit, and the “black box” Richard L. Dangle Theatre which seats up to 170 for experimental theatre, chamber music, receptions, and other small-scale events.

**Undergraduate class sections offered (including online but excluding independent study courses) at UWG has grown from 1,317 in fall 2007 to 1,599 in fall 2011. Class sections with 30 or more students increased from 407 in fall 2007 to 466 in fall 2011 indicating that student growth has not resulted in a proportional increase in larger class sections.**

## **Intercollegiate Athletics**

UWG Athletics is a member of the NCAA, Division II, and the Gulf South Conference (GSC). The university currently fields 12 NCAA varsity teams: Baseball, Men's and Women's Basketball, Men's and Women's Cross Country, Football, Men's and Women's Golf, Women's Soccer, Women's Softball, Women's Tennis, and Women's Volleyball. The Athletics department also sponsors both Co-Ed and All-Girl UCA Cheerleading squads.

## **The Coliseum**

The Coliseum is the largest enclosed public assembly facility between Atlanta and Birmingham with a maximum capacity of 6,500 for athletic events. The facility is home to the UWG Wolves basketball and volleyball. In addition to athletic events, the Coliseum hosts concerts, UWG and local high school graduations, orientations, corporate meetings, sport camps, political forums and community events.

The University System of Georgia, consisting of 35 institutions, enrolled a total of 318,027 students in fall 2011. The 35 institutions are classified into five categories: the 4 research universities enrolled 29 percent of the total students; the 2 regional universities enrolled 11 percent; the 13 state universities enrolled 31 percent; the 14 state colleges enrolled 28 percent; and the 2 two-year colleges enrolled 1 percent. The University of West Georgia's records enrollment in fall 2011 accounted for almost 12 percent of the state universities' and for approximately 4 percent of the USG's total enrollment.
