Fall 2012 enrollment reached an all-time high with 11,769 students, an increase of 1.1 percent compared to last year. Graduate student enrollment increased 11.7 percent from last year with a significant 19.7 percent increase of males enrolled in graduate studies.

Continuing to blaze trails, the first Doctorate of Philosophy (Ph.D.) in Psychology was awarded on July 28, 2012. UWG is the first institution in USG history to award a Ph.D. outside of the four research universities.

Distance and Distributed Education

The University of West Georgia through the Department of Distance and Distributed Education Center offers credit courses at times and locations outside of the traditional classroom environment. The courses utilize the internet to deliver materials, assignments, facilitate discussion, and other appropriate interactions. Distance or Distributed courses are delivered fully or partially online through two-way live videoconferencing or through a combination of technologies. In the University System of Georgia, if more than 50 percent of instruction in a course is delivered via distance technologies, it is classified as a Distance Education course. Continuing Education

The Department of Continuing Education and Public Services identifies and provides non-credit educational opportunities to the public that will enhance the quality of life and provide training support to business and industry that will serve as a catalyst for economic growth. The CEU is defined as ten contact hours of participation in a qualified continuing education program and is recognized as the national standard for measuring an individual's participation in a non-credit program. Category I programs qualifying for CEU credit are designed to enhance occupational skills, and individual permanent transcripts are maintained. Category II courses designed primarily for personal enrichment and are social, cultural, or recreational in nature and no individual permanent transcripts are maintained.

The School of Nursing received a two-year \$503,020 award through the University System of Georgia's (USG) Nursing Faculty Initiative. The award supports the expansion of the School's new, entirely online doctoral program—an Ed.D. degree in Nursing Education. The program is the only program of its type in Georgia and one of a few in the nation designed specifically to prepare nursing faculty.

UWG's undergraduate tuition and fees for 2012-2013 totaled \$6,710 for in-state and \$18,986 for out-of-state. Undergraduate tuition and fees for 2013-2014 total \$6,832 for in-state and \$19,414 for out-of-state for students taking 15 credit hours for two semesters.

Center Pointe Suites, the new 600-bed residence complex, opened fall 2012. The complex features comfortable single and double rooms with private and semi-private bathrooms, a TV lounge, glass-enclosed study overlook, large study rooms, card-controlled access, free extended basic cable, and other amenities.
