We are having another fantastic year at UWG. All of our programs are going strong thanks to our outstanding students, faculty, staff and clinical and community partners!

We have just admitted the largest class ever to our prelicensure program. Students admitted to this program have an average GPA of 3.5 and once again, there were more qualified applicants than we have the capacity to admit. Our NCLEX pass rates continue to be well above the national average. Our RN to BSN program is 100% online and an innovative, studentsupportive way for nurses returning to school to complete their BSN. Our MSN graduates are influencing health care as nurse educators, clinical

nurse leaders and nurse managers. Our BSN and MSN students have clinical and practicum rotations in a wide variety of health care institutions and educational settings. Further, we are actively pursuing expanding students' experiences to even more settings, with a special focus on increasing encounters in specialty areas and non-acute community settings. Finally yet importantly, our EdD graduates are functioning in academic roles at schools and colleges of nursing across the country. Seventy percent of students who have graduated from the program have published their dissertation research in refereed professional journals, truly a testament to excellence in the scholarship of teaching and learning we are known for!

The last year has been a banner year in terms of the growth and development of faculty and staff! Six colleagues stepped into new leadership roles and three received promotions. Nine new faculty and staff joined us in the Fall of 2017. I've shared a little about each of these colleagues in this newsletter.

We have also experienced an increased number of alumni and friends who have been supporting the school through contributions to the annual and scholarship funds. Your gifts are so important to allowing us to recruit and retain excellent students and faculty and maintain cutting edge technology in the School. With your help, we will further increase the number of excellent nurses and nurse educators in the State of Georgia and beyond. Our health depends on it!


Students and Faculty Care: Nursing Student Presents Research on Caring Curriculum
