The Association of Retired Faculty & Staff (ARFS)

was established in 2004 as a voluntary association of the university's retired faculty and staff who joined together for several purposes: to promote the well-being of its members; support the University of West Georgia retiree community; foster continued involvement of retirees in the mission of the university; facilitate communication between the university and its retirees; seek to promote the scholarly, social, and cultural interests of the retiree community; and address matters related to benefits and resources for retirees.

Membership in ARFS is free and members decide for themselves how much involvement they wish to have in the organization and its activities.

Each year, ARFS recognizes persons from the faculty and staff who have retired from full-time employment at the university. Unfortunately, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we have had online events the last two years. We are once again planning an in-person reception for the 2O22 annual meeting and recognition of retirees. Participating 2O21-2O22 retirees will receive a medallion from the university with their name, department, and years of service engraved on it. Those attending the reception will have a formal picture taken when they come onstage to receive the medallion at the reception. Retirees may also choose to be included in this commemorative booklet. Retirees from 2O19-2O2O and 2O2O-2O21, who already have their medallions and commemorative tribute booklets, will be recognized in two groups at the in-person reception this year.

Many activities in which ARFS members have typically been involved were curtailed again in 2021 and 2022. In the past, ARFS has sponsored programs featuring adventures of our traveling colleagues, and members have participated in various activities, including campus tours, off-campus trips, service projects, parades, plays, and concerts. Recently, participation has been limited to sharing information through the ARFS listserv, problem solving for retirees requesting information, and publishing our newsletter, *The Rejuvenator*. If you have suggestions about activities you would like to see us organize, especially once COVID-19 is contained, please do let us know.

About eight years ago, ARFS joined a national organization of retiree organizations in higher education, known as AROHE (Association of Retirement Organizations in Higher Education -- https://www.arohe.org/). Through a state subsidiary of that group, GA-HERO (https://ga-hero.org/), some of us have attended meetings with retirees in higher education from all around Georgia. In the meetings, we have learned a lot about what other retiree organizations are doing. Any of you are welcome to join those who attend these meetings. Meetings have been held online via Zoom and will continue with in-person and/or online options in the future.

In 2015 the University System of Georgia created a retiree council (USGRC) to advise the Chancellor's Office and the Board of Regents on matters of consequence to retirees. The president of the ARFS Coordinating Council is

our "official voting member" at USGRC meetings, and we are also allowed a designated "alternate member" in the event our official voting member cannot make the meeting. Currently, Anne Richards is serving as the "alternate member" in order to take notes to pass along to others. While the USGRC continues to have a focus on Medicare-eligible retirees' use of Alight Retiree Health Solutions (formerly the Aon Retiree Healthcare Exchange), it is also looking at many other issues of concern to retirees, including access to library resources on system campuses, well-being resources/services for retirees, and communication matters.

To become a member of ARFS is easy. Just contact Meg Cooper (mcooper@ westga.edu, 770-880-5078), Anne Richards (arichard@westga.edu, 770-834-8143), or Lauren Niedringhaus (lniedringhaus@westga.edu, 678-839-1034) to let us know you want to join. We will need contact information. An e-mail address will help most since we use the ARFS listserv to share a variety of information. However, our newsletter, *The Rejuvenator*, is also distributed by postal mail when necessary. We invite you to become an active member of this organization, especially as we are able to get back to more in-person events.

We also hope you will take advantage of some or all of the benefits available to you as a retiree. There are a lot of them, such as a courtesy parking hangtag, eligibility for free membership to utilize all facilities in the Campus Center (secured in 2017), participation in well-being activities, a listing in a planned retiree directory if you would like, eligibility to check out books from the Ingram Library, reduced rates on West Georgia Theatre Company performances, free admission to UWG athletic events, and a 10% discount at the University Bookstore. We continue to look into the possibility of securing other benefits as well.

Students may apply by going to the University of West Georgia Scholarship Portal (https://westga.scholarships.ngwebsolutions.com/CMXAdmin/Cmx_Content.aspx?cpld=896) and following the instructions. Scholarship Application will open annually in October. The scholarship deadline for incoming students is February 1st. Priority will be given to students who apply before February 1st, but applications will be considered until a candidate is selected.

Eligibility Criteria:

- * Recipients will be full-time graduate or undergraduate students who are retirees of the institution or who are direct descendants or an immediate family relation of a retired faculty or staff member (with a minimum of 10 years of service to the institution).
- * Recipients will have minimum cumulative GPA 2.5, with preference given to applicants with higher GPA.
- * Preference will be given to applicants with a demonstrated financial need as determined by the UWG Financial Aid Office.



Anita Bryant came to work as the departmental administrative assistant in the Geology Department in 1994, and she has seen many changes over her tenure here. The Geology Department became the Geosciences Department (adding in Geography) and was later reorganized to the Department of Mathematics, Science, and Technology, swelling the faculty that she and one other admin supported to almost 100! That was then subdivided, and Anita worked with the Department of Natural Sciences, handling all administrative duties for the geology, geography, and biology programs.

Anita always made her job look easy because she was so capable. She handled complicated travel paperwork associated with a field trip-heavy department, grants, budgets, student issues, and everything else involved with administering a department. Jeannette Diaz came to the Psychology Department in 2008 as an Assistant Professor. With a PhD from the University of California, Riverside, Dr. Diaz brought a wealth of expertise in social policy, community psychology, and developmental psychology, along with a keen focus on social justice. Her award-winning doctoral dissertation focused on social psychological dynamics of African American and Korean American relations in Los Angeles during the heightened times of unrest in the wake of the Rodney King beating.

Dr. Diaz taught a wide range of courses, including Community Psychology, Human Growth and Development, Human Service Practicum, Integrative Seminar, Introduction to Psychology, Personal Relationships, Psychology and Globalization, Transformational Leadership, Community Mental Health, and Critical Foundations of Psychology. She also served on several Master's and PhD Dissertation Committees.

She developed an active research program, publishing work on social justice praxis, food insecurity, nutrition in low-income residents in rural Georgia, and globalization, as well as many community-based initiatives in Haiti. Jeannette was able to share with countless UWG students and the wider discipline a unique approach to psychology which understands mental health and intergroup relations as emerging from political and economic history. Many students and colleagues have been inspired by her passion, curiosity, and sense of justice.

In August of 1990, Teri Lewis was hired as secretary to the University of West Georgia Newnan Center's first director. Upon her retirement 32 years later, she was UWG Newnan's longest-serving team member. Through her determination and dedication to UWG, Teri advanced from secretary to academic instructional support specialist during her time at UWG.

Teri was asked to develop a testing site for Newnan; she was responsible for administering a comprehensive test-proctoring environment that promoted integrity, accessibility, and reliable technology. Over the decades, Teri proctored thousands of exams, providing a holistic approach to services and compassion to all.

In 2015, UWG transitioned to 80 Jackson Street. Teri continued to successfully manage the day-to-day operations of the 66,261 square-foot facility, a large change from the much smaller location of before, but Teri handled the change with grace.

Throughout Teri's career, she won many awards including the Risk Management Award in 2018.

Teri's focus on kindness meant that no faculty or students left feeling unloved or unsupported. One student and employee of UWG Newnan reminisced that "Teri is the most selfless person I know, and every room is better with her in it." Everyone should strive to be a bit more like Teri every day.

An articulate and dedicated educator, she received numerous awards and honors for her teaching, leadership, and service. She has also distinguished herself in various national, state, and local professional and community organizations and timely and meaningful publications and presentations on matters of consequence, discerning and capable contributions to committee work, and long-term service on Boards of Directors. 
