ECON 3411 Intermediate Macroeconomics

Prerequisite: ECON 2105 & 2106, MATH 1111 or 1113

The course develops models of the economic behavior of consumers, firms, and governments. The topics include: supply and demand, competitive equilibrium and the role of prices in resource allocation, non-competitive market structures, game theory and strategy, externalities, public goods and public policy

ECON 4410 Money and Banking

An Introductory study of the types and functions of money and financial Intermediaries, money creation and control, monetary and fiscal policy, international finance, and the effects of these upon domestic incomes, employment, prices, and interest rates.

ECON 4450 International Economics

Prerequisite: Econ 2105 & 2106

This course covers the history, institutions, policy and theory of international economic relations.

ECON 4484 Seminar in Economics

The course is the capstone course for all economic majors. The course will change topics and focus. The course will include an evaluation of the students understanding of economic principles.
