## ... Outcomes

In order to pass MUSC 2600K the student must demonstrate:

- 1. improvement or mastery of the appropriate playing or singing techniques.
- 2. the ability to perform in lessons one or more compositions, suited to the student's ability, that he or she had not previously

studied.

- 3. the ability to perform publicly
- 4. the ability to play or sing selected scales, arpeggios, and/or other technique building studies required for the 4600-level-change examination.
- 5. knowledge and understandings of the style, composer, and characteristics of each work studied.
- 6. the ability to produce a characteristic saxophone sound based on the individual student's conception of sound and the study/evaluation of artist level musicians
- 7. the development of technique through consistent practice of scales, arpeggios, exercises, and etudes
- 8. the ability to use proper embouchure, correct voicing and breathing, appropriate fingerings, vibrato, proper finger and hand position, proper articulation technique, and an appropriate dynamic range in scales, exercises, etudes, solo music, chamber music, and large ensemble music
- 9. the ability to sight-read at a reasonable level
- 10. the ability to play with excellent intonation when performing alone, with piano, or with small or large ensemble
- 11. the ability to learn at least two new works per semester (plus exercises, scales, arpeggios, and etudes assigned by the instructorsee studio handbook)
- 12. the ability to perform as a soloist, chamber musician, and large ensemble member
- 13. the ability to complete successfully the semester by semester requirements for lower division saxophone study outlined in the UWG Saxophone Studio Course of Study (see Studio Handbook)

Demonstrates substantial inconsistency in practicing. The lesson shows only marginal improvement, and no new material can be assigned. Within reasonable expectations the student has not worked to his/her highest potential.

Demonstrates little or no practice/preparation. The lesson shows no improvement, and no new material can be assigned. Within reasonable expectations the student has not worked to his/her highest potential. The student may be asked to leave by the instructor to practice for the remainder of the scheduled lesson.

Demonstrates no practice/preparation. The will be asked to leave by the instructor to practice for the remainder of the scheduled lesson. This grade will also be assigned for unexcused missed lessons.

\*Please be prompt for your lesson and <u>always warm up prior to your lesson</u>. Students who come into the lesson obviously "cold" will be asked to leave the lesson.

Your semester grade will be based on a percentage of points earned over the semester relative to the sum total of actual points. Each lesson and studio class performance will be worth 10 points. Your jury will be worth 25 points.

Jordan Thorne's senior recital (date and time TBD) and the Mestizo Saxophone Quartet (Thursday, March 12, 8:15PM, with a possible master class during the day). Students who do not attend both of these events will have their semester grade lowered by one full letter.

## **m** Schedule

Lessons will be scheduled at a mutually agreeable time for the student and instructor. Please remember to indicate three available times for lessons on your lesson preference time form! The instructor may need to ask you to change lesson times to accommodate school/recruiting visits.

# \* Course Policies and Resources

### Weekly lessons

Weekly lessons will consist of assigned tone development studies, intonation exercises, scales, etudes, solo repertoire, and sight-reading. Each student is expected to commit an appropriate amount of time to daily practice in preparation for each lesson. You should allot one daily practice hour for each credit hour, so for a 2 credit lesson you should be practicing 2 hours per day. You will receive a grade for each lesson based on the following scale. Each student is expected to order all etude books and solo materials promptly. I will not supply copies from my personal library. Students who do not obtain music within a reasonable amount of time will have their semester grade lowered at the instructor's discretion.

### Studio class

Studio class meetings (3:30-4:45 on January 6, February 3, March 9, and April 27)

- Attendance is mandatory for all applied saxophone students (even those who have completed MUSC 1000)
- You will perform on each studio class of the semester! Your studio class performances can be a movement from a multimovement piece, a complete piece, an etude, or scales assigned by the instructor.

Please submit piano scores to Jan no later than Monday, February 3 for jury repertoire. Students failing to meet this deadline will have their semester grade lowered by one full letter (no exceptions). Juries must be performed with piano (except of course in the case of an unaccompanied piece). Students are required to schedule at least one rehearsal with Jan that I can attend by Wednesday, April 8. Your semester grade will be lowered by one full letter if this requirement is not met. Students who fail to make arrangements to perform a jury with piano accompaniment will (1) receive a grade of zero for the jury portion of the semester grade and (2) will have their semester grade lowered by one full letter.

### **General Expectations**

SOLO PERFORMANCE: Because performing is the essence of music, students are encouraged to perform as often as possible. It is expected that you will perform (at minimum) on one MUSC 1000 recital, each studio class if registered for MUSC 1000, and your jury each semester. It is further expected that you will be proactive about selecting repertoire and taking care of logistics with your accompanist, scheduling rehearsals, and arranging coaching sessions with the instructor. You must play any piece to be performed in public for the instructor AT LEAST two weeks before the performance. Only in this way can I help you play to your maximum potential.

Chamber Music: Chamber music is becoming ever more important in today's musical world, especially given the economies of scale. The skills acquired in chamber music playing are a natural outgrowth and reinforcement of individual applied lessons. It is essential for saxophonists to become familiar with all aspects of ensemble playing: repertoire, arranging, musicality, intonation, communication, rehearsal techniques, and creativity. In addition to the development of your own musicianship, the UWG Saxophone Ensemble is one of our primary means of attracting more quality saxophone students to campus, which raises the overall level of the saxophone studio and enhances your experience as a saxophone major. All saxophone majors are expected to play in the UWG Saxophone Ensemble (and saxophone quartet if possible) each semester.

Practice: The National Association of Schools of Music has set as a guideline one hour of daily practice for each lesson credit. So a student registered for one credit should practice for one hour, students registered for two credits should practice for two hours, etc. Please keep in mind students at large music schools routinely practice for four to five hours daily. The level of instrumental playing (and the competition that results from that level) has never been higher! I expect that you will meet and exceed these minimum practice requirements.

ATTITUDE: Students are encouraged to take initiative and set out in their own directions (within reason). If you want to study a specific piece of music, please do so! Saxophone majors are required to learn certain core literature, studies and scales etc., however, this is the time to use your imagination. Listen to recordings, go to concerts, read scores, play chamber music, and be an active part of the saxophone community at UWG. If you want to learn something that we haven't covered, please ask!

### Minimum Achievement for Grade Contract Agreement

The instructor reserves the right to issue a Minimum Achievement for Grade Contract to any student who is not making satisfactory progress in learning scales, etudes, or repertoire. This contract can be issued at any point the semester if necessary.

### **Instrument Ownership**

Each music major student registered for applied music instruction is expected to own a professional level instrument in excellent working condition. This is the only way to ensure that the student has the best chance to make consistent progress and improvement in his/her playing. While the Department of Music owns several professional level instruments, these are for the purpose of facilitating balanced instrumentation in UWG ensembles and <u>NOT</u> as a long term loan for students to use in place of their own instruments. The instructor reserves the right to withdraw any student from applied music, who, at the instructor's discretion, has not made a sufficient effort to obtain a professional level instrument for herself/himself.

### Rescheduling of Lessons

Students are expected to be prepared for lessons at their regularly scheduled times. If I have to rearrange a lesson I will give you notice as far in advance as possible. You are allowed (but not encouraged) to reschedule <u>two</u> during the semester due to illness or other legitimate conflict. You will receive a zero for each lesson that you attempt to rearrange beyond the allowed two.

### **Academic Dishonesty**

Any student found to have fabricated circumstances/excuses regarding absence from lesson(s) will be given an "F" for the semester on the grounds of academic dishonesty.
