- •Exploring your needs and options, including ways in which campus and/or local law enforcement can assist
- •Developing a personal safety plan (in conjunction with Campus Police)
- •Assisting in the decision whether to file formal complaints or charges
- •Serving as a liaison with other campus offices and faculty, if needed
- •Linking you with confidential community counseling services
- •Providing links to off-campus resources, including resources in your home town
- •Advocating with the Department of Residence Life regarding a room or hall change if space permits
- •Assisting with a referral to the Carroll County Emergency Shelter, if desired
- •Linking you with academic resources
- •Assisting you in requesting a temporary withdrawal from UWG if you believe it is needed
